September 11, 2014 I received a call from my doctor's basel doctor who tells me that the results of Biopsy of a lymph node in my neck showed lung cancer?! How is it possible? I am (it was) 39 and I stopped smoking five years before and felt totally 100% healthy. I had my hands full of a 1 year old child and felt as if I could run a marathon if inclined. Nevertheless, what was followed was a test battery, meetings with an oncologist and a full survey on what exactly was happening here. The fact that I felt good was disconcerting from my doctor doctor Quite soon we would have our reply. Yes, I had lung cancer, yes, he was in Stadio IV, but the presentation of her was an anomaly. I have no tumors or sign of it in my lungs of sort. It is completely confined to the lymph nodes in my chest (most, if not all) and neck. My doctor only saw this presentation in two other patients during his 8+ years in the sector. After doing genetic tests on my cancer (which has returned as a HER2 mutation, including incredibly rare in lung cancer) a treatment plan has been implemented. Six chemo shifts (cisplatin, avastin and alimta) were prescribed every three weeks. Followed by 35 intense sessions, a vast range of chest and neck radiation. Fortunately my cancer is incredibly sensitive to treatment and I am currently NED. I still maintain chemo every 4 weeks (hoping to reach every 6 weeks at the end). However I feel incredibly lucky and now I want to share my story with the hope that can somehow, in any way, help others. Whether it's to quit smoking (or never start), or to get scanning as a means to get an early diagnosis, or simply to give others hope that you can live and prosper with this horrible disease. Organizations such as the American Lung Association and Force Lung are a huge part of this and your money and / or time are instrumental in making sure that new treatments are studied and awareness for our cause is spreading. At 11 December 2014 I was at work and had a chest pain on my left. I was thinking I'm having a heart attack. I went to the emergency room and they made an electrocardiogram - everything was good with my heart. They then made a TAC and that when I received the news that changed my life forever. The emergency room doctor said very no means, "we found a place on the lung that seems to be a tumor." I also had pneumonia due to tumor. I looked at my husband and said, "I need a bag, I'm going to be sick." I made my husband promise not to share the news with our two adult daughters or anyone else until we learned more. It was scheduled to have a biopsy and many more tests and would need to see an oncologist. My 44-year-old husband secretly confide in a friend who is a PA in Mayo Clinic; He was so scared he had to find out what this meant for me. We were both avoiding any conversation around "it", even among us. I was completely in denial. We were both very scared and I felt like I was given a death sentence. I mean, who lives more than three months with lung cancer? I was Healthy woman of 63 years. I don't even feel bad when I got pneumonia! No cough, without trouble, without copco - nothing! Fast forward at the end of January 2015. We met with the oncologist and discovered the specifications; not well. Step 4, tumors in both lungs. The recommended doctor chemo once every three weeks for eight hours at a time, it was exhausting! We finally after the holidays and when we knew everything about my diagnosis is shared with my two daughters, who have completely collapsed. I ended up telling the rest of my family shortly thereafter. There were a lot of "I" I You ", tears and," you can beat this! "I wasn't so sure I could! I started my 12 weeks of chemo, lost my hair, bought seven wigs (I wanted to have fun having fun) and actually managed chemo quite well into consideration. I continued to work, sometimes a. home if I didn't feel up to speed, but most of the time I pushed myself to go to the office. By now I had decided that I would have beaten this and "cancer was messy with the wrong person!"
