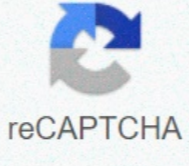




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Shakespeare and the law

This is the question Melissa Sarnicke , , , , , , , , , , is, considered the largest playwright of all time, William Shakespeare was an English playwright, poet e Actor who published about 37 works and 154 sonnets alive [1]. However, he is controversy on literary heir to him, and his use of advanced legal terminology to his shows was the subject of debate [1]. Born in 1564 in Stratford-upon-Avon, England, Shakespeare was polite in King New School, where he learned to read and write. In 1592, Shakespeare became an actor and playwright, earning himself to live as a managing partner of a theatrical company called the Lord Chamberlain e s men [2]. By the end of 1590 e s, Shakespeare had published 15 theatrical works, including the comedies of him well known, as you like it, a lot of noise at all, and twelfth night to name a few. Towards the end of his career, he published the rest of his works, including most of him's famous tragedies, Hamlet, Othello, Macbeth and King Lear [1]. During many of him's works, Shakespeare demonstrated his considerable width of knowledge by referring to the law. He included scenes in the comedies of him who highlighted his vast knowledge of the law. In two thirds of Shakespeare's dramas, he has depicted test scenes [3]. Two examples of games that included test scenes are the Venice merchant and measure measurement. A number of other comedies of him contained characters who commented on the law, lawyers, government, revenge, power and his transfer, the nature of the state, inheritance and contracts [3]. Shakespeare used the opening of Enrico V to address the question of whether women were legally authorized to govern England [4]. He also demonstrated his knowledge of a famous case in English jurisprudence, Hales v. Petit, in the famous game of him, Hamlet [4]. Shakespeare also added a certain legal mood in the comedies of him, such as the dialogue between touchstone and Corin in Act 3, Scene 2 of how you like: Touchstone: Wast never in court, pastor? Corin: No, really. Touchstone: So you're damned. Corin: No, I hope. Touchstone: In truth, you are damned as a poorly roasted egg, all on one side. Corin: To not be a court? The reason? Touchstone: because, if you were not at court, you would never see good manners; If you have never seen good manners, then your manners must be evil; And the evil is sin, and sin is damnation. You are in a difficult condition, pastor [5]. Of Shakespeare s frequent references to the law in the comedies of him have led many to wonder if he was actually the true author of the works of him, or if he was always educated in English law. The legal references of him brought the theorists to hypothesize that a person with legal training, other than Shakespeare, wrote dramas [4]. On the other hand, some scholars believe that Shakespeare may have worked as a law employee during the Years e lost a part of his life, 1585-1595 [4]. There are few evidence that Shakespeare was doing in this period of his life. However, Shakespeare had many friends who were lawyers, and many spectators of him's performances were lawyers, and he used these reports to learn about the law [3]. He also consulted in these acquaintances to review him comedies of him [3]. Although there are many unanswered questions about Shakespeare's education s on the law and if he was the author of the works of him, who had a lasting impact on readers, especially lawyers. According to Daniel in his article, a Shakespeare the unknowledged legislator, , , all lawyers should read Shakespeare, if only, legendary beauty and lasting power of his expression. Lawyers depend heavily on words and language; They must be sensitive to nuances and meaning] They will become better and speakers speakers thus better advocates e for having studied Shakespeare with an eye toward their PROFESSIONA [3]. Of Shakespeare's comedies allow lawyers to grasp a relationship between the human nature and the law. The works of him illuminate the fundamental aspects of the right, such as the relationship between law and morality, the way in which revenge plays a role in the law, and as a think as a lawyer e [3]. Kornstein says, e The list of legal topics related to Shakespeare goes on and on, each one pushing [lawyers] to question our most fundamental assumptions of understanding e Legal [3]. Not only did Shakespeare has had an impact on English law, but the playwright was also cited or of which almost 800 legal opinions from state and federal courts according to a 1993 study [3]. Kornstein says, It's Shakespeare's fingerprints are all over our American legal furniture. He is not surprising that, perhaps, he was cited or quoted by US courts more often than any other literary figure e [3]. Of Shakespeare's inclusion of legal topics in his works he influence the attorneys in the United States, and the work of it continues to be cited by lawyers today. Shakespeare's literary works are timeless. The works of his readers were impressed, particularly lawyers. His legal terminology and legal issues embedded in the plays of him are quite impressive, considering that it is likely that he had no formal legal training. Whether or not Shakespeare was the true author of the works of him, their content, style, and the lessons they teach, including those on the right, are remarkable.
